One member's voice

Deepening that conscious contact

A story of experience, strength, and hope

Step Eleven. Sought through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with God as we understood Him, praying only for knowledge of His will for us and the power to carry that out.

About four years ago, I experienced a truly dark period in my sobriety. My father died, the housing boom went bust, and I lost my sponsor and five of my dearest friends, all within a year's time. I didn't want to drink, but my relationship with my higher power was on shaky ground. Suddenly, that feeling I knew so well before sobriety — of emptiness and of being alone in the universe, was front and center.

I had spent most of my life avoiding feeling anything and fearful of everything. At that time in my life, however, I had no choice but to feel everything and fear nothing. Our book, Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions, cautions, "All of us, without exception, pass through times when we can pray only with the greatest exertion of will," that we could be "seized with a rebellion so sickening that we simply won't pray." I knew exactly what the book was talking about.

Thank God (literally), I had been sober a while, joined a great home group, found a new sponsor, and was married to a sober husband who seemed to "keep the faith" for both of us. All these things kept me sober, and I kept hearing the words of my deceased sponsor, Ann K., who responded to almost any "problem" I brought her, "You have to turn it over, Pam."

It wasn't easy, but just as I had done as a newcomer; I had to call on a power much greater than myself.

Tradition Eleven Spiritual submission for the good of the whole

"Our public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion; we need always maintain personal anonymity at the level of press, radio, and film.

Talk about controversy. In this modern age of instant communication, it takes an act of great humility for celebrities and people of large egos to abide by much less understand — AA's Tradition Eleven.

Recently on a public radio station, a man who had written a book about the eleventh tradition indicated that he had decided that this tradition was archaic. He felt that he could help many more people achieve sobriety by spreading the message publicly.

Personally, I felt sorry for this man because he obviously missed the whole

gist of our program. It is not Tradition Eleven (Long for me to decide as an individual what is good or not good for AA as a whole. Rather, it is for me to submit spiritually for the good of the whole. For ego-driven people that is very difficult.

AA has public information service committees that exist solely to communicate accurate information about Alcoholics Anonymous to the general public. A look at the original long form of Tradition Eleven demonstrates far better than someone else's words can describe, the original intent of our founders regarding anonymity.

"Our relations with the general public should be characterized by personal anonymity. We think AA should avoid sensational advertising. Our names and pictures as AA members should not be broadcast. filmed, or publicly printed. Our public relations should be guided by the principal of attraction rather than promotion. There is never need to praise ourselves. We feel better to let our friends recommend us. "

I have always sought a connection to God. Raised in the Episcopal Church, and fascinated by the Christian mystics, I studied Hinduism, Buddhism, Taoism, and the spiritual ways of the Yaqui, the Dine, and other indigenous peoples.

I practiced meditation, joined study groups, and participated in ceremonies. All of that brought me closer to God, but AA taught me how to live the spiritual principles that I had acquired "in all my affairs," even, and especially in challenging times.

Alcoholics Anonymous, the Big Book, tells us exactly how to find the power greater than ourselves, and then, in Step Eleven, how to deepen that conscious contact. Specific prayers are given. It suggests we start the day by asking that God's will be done, and that we rely on God's strength to do that. It also suggests we end the day in gratitude. In case we still don't get it, we have our sponsor and an amazing number of meetings to help us out.

Gratitude is a common theme discussed in most spiritual literature, but AA spells it out. It is often suggested that we write a list of all the things for which we are grateful, and to say a prayer of thanks throughout the day. We hear that a "grateful heart cannot get drunk."

The medieval mystic, Meister Eck-

hart, put it like this, "If the only prayer you ever say in your whole life is 'thank you,' it will be enough."

Gratitude overwhelms me when I think about that difficult time four years ago. I can see that my higher power, the AA program, my new sponsor, and the fellowship did for me what I could not do for myself.

I have had experiences in sobriety that I thought I'd surely drink over and found that as long as I keep coming back, working the program of Alcoholics Anonymous —which teaches me to live a God-centered life — I may just have that "daily reprieve" from alcoholism I heard about when I first walked through that door.

tradition was at the level of public anonymity.

Doctor Bob said there were two ways to break this tradition: (1) by giving your name at the level of press or radio, and (2) by being so anonymous that you can't be reached by other drunks.

According to Doctor Bob, "Within the group every member should know the home address and phone number of all group members." Because of the size to which AA and its individual groups have grown, that has proven to be impractical without help. Thus, many groups print lists of and for members who want to make sure "the hand of AA" is always accessible to those who reach out for it, yet keep the true intent

of this tradition and not operate beyond the level of anonymity intended.

District 17 Corner Sponsorship. A vital stepping-stone to service and sobriety

How many of you came to service in keep it." AA with the help of a sponsor? We sponsor as we have been sponsored. Like so many members. I absorbed the miracle of Twelfth-Step work — that sharing the AA message with other alcoholics helps to keep us sober.

Thanks to alert sponsorship, I then learned how such one-on-one help in the Fellowship can be stretched to include an ever widening range of twelfth -stepping—from becoming active within one's group, to serving at the local intergroup or central office, on committees, and finally in "general service."

This term embraces the myriad activities within the Conference structure that are carried out by GSRs, area committees, delegates, trustees and the GSO staff. They affect AA as a whole and are crucial to our unity and survival.

A lot of AAs—not just newcomers, either-don't know enough about AA and how it works." He believes that "God smiled on us when he led us into the Fellowship. The hand of AA was there for us and if we want it to be there for your kids and mine, I think we need to be active ourselves in service and help the newcomer to do the same. Frankly, I don't even know how to sponsor anyone who doesn't get involved in service. I'm a great admirer of Dr. Bob. who said that if we fail to acquire a spirit of service, we will have missed the greatest gift AA has to offer — the ability to give our sobriety away and so

After I finally stopped drinking, my sponsor and other old timers told me I was the kind of drunk who had to be

active to stay sober. I took them at their word and have continued to do so for 26 years. Service is a part of me. I was active in every aspect of service except general service, perceiving it to be full of basic service club types.

My closest AA friend was active in general service and I just figured it was an eccentricity—otherwise he was a nice, cosmopolitan guy. Finally, he dragged me along with him and I questioned my motives in doing service work—was it love of AA or a need for recognition and approval? I believe that general service may not be for everyone. "Instead of pushing people into it," I think we should lead them by example. We need to treat each other in service with the same sensitivity we bring to

Encourage people you sponsor to participate in service work, "I don't just send them to service meetings at the beginning, I take them myself."

Intergroup 17 **Book of the Month** Came to Believe

Five years of preparation and earnest thought went into this publication, since an AA member first pointed out the need for it.

The description of Alcoholics Anonymous as a "spiritual program" has been confusing to some newcomers, many of whom tend to translate "spiritual" as

"religious." But as our cofounder Dr. Bob said in an AA Grapevine article, "We are not bound by theological doctrine....We are many minds in our organization."

Came to Believe... is designed as an outlet for the rich diversity of convictions implied in "God as we understood Him." Most of the material was written expressly for the book in response to an appeal issued by the General Service Office. The places of origin shown for each story of brief comment indicate how widespread this response was.

And the Fellowship can be grateful to all those who took the trouble to set down their spiritual journeys in writing, whether or not their contributions appear in this booklet. Without such a broad view of membership thinking, it would not have been possible to make a truly representative selection.

Originally, our co-founder Bill W. planned to write a foreword. In lieu of this, the introductions to each section reflect Bill's outlook, already on record in the book As Bill Sees It.
